Theme 2 – Active Healthy Community

2.1 By 2020 together we will deliver a high standard of healthcare which is holistic, innovative and services that needs of all residents locally with an emphasis on preventative health programs

2.1.1 Increased local healthcare services in Roma, including dental, mental health, general, allied and specialist services.

- Roma Hospital has been classified as a district hospital, under guidelines for rural and remote health facilities
- Roma Hospital and allied health services offer:
 - 39-bed facility that offers medical, emergency, maternity and surgical services, plus retrievals with the Royal Flying Doctor Service.
 - Offers child health services, including paediatric speech pathology, a parent café, breastfeeding clinic, immunisation clinic, paediatric occupational therapy and physiotherapy.

Theme 5 Maranoa on the Move

5.1 By 2020 together we will provide the community with a safe, accessible, reliable, sustainable, cost effective and affordable transport system that is well connected and enables the efficient movement of people and products throughout the Maranoa and successfully integrates into regional, state and national transport network systems.

5.1.1 Significant upgrade of the Warrego Highway servicing the communities of Roma, Hodgson and Muckadilla to eliminate safety hazards and cater for the significant increase in passenger and heavy vehicle traffic.

5.1.2 Development and implementation of an annual schedule of programmed maintenance for existing road networks in town and rural locations to ensure capacity to meet the demands of current and future traffic flows.

5.1.3 Ensure the provision of parking for a range of vehicles including long body vehicles (trucks, motorhomes, car and trailer / caravan combinations) in several well signed locations accessible to the CBD.

5.1.4 Develop and maintain Roma airport infrastructure to accommodate the high demand for airport services and passenger traffic, including significant terminal modernisation and

- Significant improvements made to Warrego and Carnarvon Highways as part of flood recovery works
- annual schedules of programmed maintenance for existing road networks in town and rural locations to ensure capacity to meet the demands of current and future traffic flows
- Truck break-up area on western side of Roma has been improved

5.1.7 Provision of local public transport which is effective, reliable, accessible and affordable to residents.

5.1.8 Investigate the feasibility of a 'loop' bus service operating throughout Roma.
